## News from the STA Mass communities:

**7:15 Daily Mass:** Msgr. Boyle has recovered from his pace-maker surgery and is presiding at this Mass again regularly.

**7:30 Sunday Mass:** Fr. John Hester presides every Sunday. He is Associate Director of Stanford Hospital's Spiritual Care Service.

**8:45 Sunday Mass:** Fr. Jose Rubio successfully completed the stair climb up the Bank of America building on March 27 to raise money for the American Lung Association.

**10:30 Sunday Mass:** Dorene French was initiated into the Church at the Easter Vigil and baby Austin French was baptized on Easter Sunday, to the delight of husband and father Mark French.

**12:00 Sunday Mass:** A hearty roast lamb meal was enjoyed after the Easter Sunday Mass in the Thomas House hall.

**12:15 Daily Mass:** A good way to spend the lunch hour.

## Priests at St. Thomas (cont.):

Remember these statistics from last month? There are a minimum of 24 Masses per week celebrated in the parish of St. Thomas Aquinas. Fifteen of those Masses occur at our STA site: two daily—at 7:15 a.m. and 12:15 p.m., one on Saturday at 12:15 p.m., and four on Sunday. These frequent Masses require priests to preside over them, and the parish of St. Thomas Aquinas has but two priests assigned here by the bishop of San Jose: Pastor Fr. George Aranha and Parochial Vicar Fr. Thierry Geris.

Here at the STA site, we are fortunate to have several non-parish priests who celebrate Mass regularly at one

or another of the fifteen weekly Masses. One especially well-known and beloved priest is **Rev. John P. Hester**, who presides at the 7:30 a.m. Mass on Sunday.

Fr. Hester has been an associate director of the Stanford Hospital Spiritual Care Service, having served at the hospital for 35 years. According to the Rev. C. George Fitzgerald, S.T.D., Director of Spiritual Care Service, Fr. Hester has undoubtedly provided more sacraments for physicians, nurses, and staff than any other priest in the history of the medical center. He currently serves on the hospital's ethics committee and has become a mainstay of the Intensive Care Unit. He also administers one of the most active and comprehensive volunteer pro-



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grams of any medical center. Dr. Jeffrey Norton described the death of one of his patients, with whom he had worked for several years to treat her cancer:

“When I came for rounds that morning, I saw her face and knew it was time to quit. I spoke with her husband and we called Fr. John Hester,

Diana is a compelling and engaging speaker and has given leadership training in our parish in the past. Diana holds an M.A. in Theology

with honors from St. John's University, Collegeville, MN. She has served as a liturgist and music director in campus, parish, and diocesan ministries for over 20 years and has authored articles on liturgy and music in *Ministry & Liturgy*, Pastoral Music, Eucharistic Ministries, AIM, and *Today's Parish Minister*. In 2003, she received the Federation of Diocesan Liturgical Commissions' Tabat Scholarship. She is a team member of the North American Forum on the Catechu-

menate, a keynote speaker, workshop presenter, and liturgy director for national conferences, and a cantor and liturgical composer. In 2006, she joined the faculty of the Institute in Pastoral Ministries at St. Mary's University in Winaona, MN. She maintains a blog for the Diocese of San José called Work of the People - the Blog found at dsjliturgy.blogspot.com.

Besides all the above, Diana is a real person who will reach your heart with her insights and honesty.

**Thomas House update:**

The refurbishment of the Thomas House is in a new phase—one of getting to essential needs and living by financial realities. This has meant that the architect and Thomas House Project Team, in concert with the Building and Maintenance and Finance Committees, are looking at how to accomplish the basic goal of bringing basic systems (electrical, plumbing, heating) up to code, providing handicapped access to the main floor of the house, and accommodating renters in the three suites on the second floor—without breaking the parish bank!

To that end, architect Lee Lippert is tasked with re-doing his design; a new permit from the City will be sought; and the contractor who offered the most competitive bid on the first round will review the revised plans and weigh in with real costs.

who performed the Catholic sacrament of Last Rites. I am a Catholic and though both my parents have died, I do not remember ever being present for the Last Rites. The administering of the sacrament was a transformative experience. **Father Hester was able to provide dignity for this patient and her husband.**

In the midst of activities and the whirl of ICU machines, he was able to provide peace and tranquility. He focused on the patient and her husband, remembering how much she had done and the way she had lived her life. He asked her husband and me to bless the patient with holy oil.

Father Hester stood by as her husband renewed his marriage vows and promised to be loyal to her in sickness and in health. I couldn't help but think of how much I love my wife and how difficult it would

be to say good-bye to her. But then I realized, that this was not good-bye. It is not death. It is not the end of life. Rather, it is the beginning of a new life, a life that we don't totally understand, but one that we know through our faith. Sharing ... Holy Communion, it helped me feel better about the outcome of my patient and her husband.

I thought that perhaps I hadn't failed...She died with dignity in an attempt to prolong the life on Earth that she had. She really did not die—she simply began her new life. **In the end, Father Hester had the right medicine for her: he knew what she needed.** It was also obvious to the nurses, other doctors, and her husband, and finally it became obvious to me."
